
Armed Services YMCA Hawai`i belongs to a network of programs and services for military families throughout the United States

Armed Services YMCA Hawai'i offers low cost and free essential services for service members and their families tailored to the specific needs of our local military community.

ASYMCA's mission is to enhance the lives of military members and their families in spirit, mind, and body, through programs relevant to the challenges of military life. As a local non-profit organization, ASYMCA Hawaii works closely with the Department of Defense and local commands to identify gaps in services available to the military, and tailors programming to address the many stresses of military life, and the distinct needs of Hawai'i's military community. Programs fall within three main areas of service and range from deployment support, financial assistance, early education, and special events.

Celebrating the Military Family occurs every November and coincides with Military Family Month. This unique event provides community and military leaders the opportunity to honor and recognize a family from each military branch for their service and sacrifice.

Parents Night Out is a monthly childcare program held on Friday evenings. It give parents the opportunity to have a few hours to themselves while their children are in our care. Children enjoy dinner, movies, games, and other activities while making new friends from the community.

Children's Waiting Room offers a safe and nurturing environment for military children while their parent or sibling attends a medical appointment. This service is available at Tripler Army Medical Center for children six weeks to twelve years old. Although drop-ins are accepted on a space available basis, reservations are strongly recommended.

Food for Families provides food and staple pantry items for those in need at no cost through monthly 'Ohana Open Markets' and on-site ASYMCA Marketplaces. ASYMCA Hawai'i is also able to provide temporary financial assistance to military families experiencing emergencies.

Summer and Educational Camps are hosted at various times throughout the year. Please check with the branch nearest you.

Kokua Connections connects military families in Hawai'i with the local culture through hands-on, immersive experiences. Our goal is to create stewards and ambassadors of Hawaiian culture, ensuring its appreciation wherever they go.

Early Childhood Education programs are comprised of two research-based programs, Operation Little Learners (OLL), which consists of Playmorning and Early Learning Readiness, and Parent Participation Preschool (PPP). OLL is for children ages 6 months to 5 years old, and PPP is for children ages 3 to 5.

Operation Hero is an after-school program in partnership with local elementary schools designed to address the unique challenges of being a military child. The program is for children in grades 2 to 6 and runs on a semester rotation.

Father Daughter Dance and Military Children's Ball help children strengthen the connection with their parents. These events offer an entertaining outing and include a delicious buffet dinner, dancing, prizes, lots of laughter, and priceless memories.

Operation Holiday Joy provides commissary gift cards and food items necessary to prepare a delicious Thanksgiving or Christmas meal for military families who may otherwise do without.

Operation Ride Home, an annual program in partnership with Jack Daniels, sends junior enlisted servicemembers and their family home for the holiday. Eligible servicemembers receive funding towards travel from their duty station to spend time with their loved ones back home.

1917

ASYMCA Hawai'i was established to support the U.S. military in the Territory of Hawai'i. Businessmen and U.S. military officials banded together to raise funds to purchase the original Royal Hawaiian Hotel building on Richards Street. The building was demolished in 1926 and rebuilt as the Armed Services YMCA, also known as the Army Navy YMCA.

1941

The ASYMCA was a popular destination for servicemen from all branches of the military. On the night before the attack on Pearl Harbor, it hosted a lively band and dance contest. As WWII progressed, President Roosevelt tasked the YMCA to establish morale and recreation services for military personnel. ASYMCA joined forces with other groups and formed the USO.

1950

Five years after the end of WWII, ASYMCA Hawai'i concentrated its support on troops participating in the Korean War. It continued as a place of refuge and rejuvenation for military personnel, serving as a home away from home for many junior enlisted servicemembers. Excursions, game and movie nights, and all you can eat dinners were regular occurrences at the ASYMCA.

1975

By the mid-70s, an increasing number of junior enlisted personnel were married and had children. ASYMCA Hawai'i responded to the changing needs of the military by opening family centers and programs on military bases. In 1978, the ASYMCA Hawai'i building on Richards Street was added to the National Register of Historic Places.

1985

The 80s was a time to rebuild. The ASYMCA worked with the Department of Defense (DoD) and Department of Health and Human Services to develop and operate Military Family Resource Centers (MFRC) nationwide. MFRCs were adopted as an official part of the DoD in `83, and in `84, ASYMCA established MOUs with the DoD for continued support services in the U.S.

2000

ASYMCA Hawai'i opened branches on military bases in the late 80s and flourished through the 90s. With the turn of the century, it pivoted its focus to provide deployment support for military families with loved ones in the Middle East. Its historic building on Richards Street was purchased by the State of Hawai'i, and reopened as the Hawaii State Art Museum in 2002.

Armed Services YMCA Hawai'i celebrates its 100th anniversary! Founded during WWI, steadfast through Pearl Harbor, WWII, Korea, Vietnam, Afghanistan, and Iraq, ASYMCA Hawai'i is dedicated to military members and their families who serve the nation during uncertain times at a high operational tempo.
