Living aloha is a journey rooted in compassion, understanding, and a deeper connection to the world around us.

Join us for a guided **White Tern Walk** by the Hawai'i Audubon Society through the **University of Hawai'i at Mānoa** campus and explore one of Honolulu's most unique wildlife stories. The Manu o Kū (White Tern), Honolulu's official bird, is the only seabird known to nest in a major urban area—without building a nest! These elegant birds have deep cultural and historical roots in Hawai'i, long regarded as navigational guides and symbols of peace and connection to the ocean. On this walk, you'll:

- Observe active nesting sites up close
- Learn how the terns have adapted to city life
- Hear inspiring stories of local efforts to protect them

This is a fun, educational, and family-friendly way to experience nature, culture, and community in the heart of the city.
